

January of this year was my first time to travel to Cameroon, Africa. For two weeks I studied the culture of this beautiful country, developed relationships, then asked God what I was to do with what I had learned. Within months I was planning a two-week mission trip with Kelly McElfish (23 yrs.) and Brenna Comroe (19 yrs.).

On June 15th, we were welcomed by Brother Ernest Ehabe and his staff to the capital city of Yaoundé. We shared God's love with children in the community of the newest BFL church plant, traveled to BFL's "Beulahland Farms" in Dimako to see the great progress being made there, and then on to the Baka Pygmy Village where BFL has started a school and helped establish a clinic among the marginalized Baka Pygmies of Eastern Cameroon. I was blessed to see the personal growth and development of the children in just 6 months, particularly the Chief's teen daughter who accepted Christ that day.

But, it was 8 hours north in the Bossa Village that we were able to bind our hearts and spirits with the children of the Grace Tait Children's Home for 6 glorious days. The tragedies and miracles of this group of children are yet to be told. BFL stepped up to provide for these children before and after the death of Mama Grace Tait (the homes American founder who in her 70s went as a missionary to rescue kids, using her meager pension). To God be the Glory!

Kelly, Brenna and I were blessed to be, "called", to Cameroon. For when one is, "called", God has the details, the miracles, and Divine appointments ordained.

herever the gospel has impacted cultures, it inevitably has been through the local church. BFL facilitates church-planting in the city and among unreached people groups. We believe empowering national church leaders is the most strategic, cost effective and culturally sensitive way to advance the Gospel. Nationals or indigenous folks are better fitted physically and psychologically for reaching their own people. We are in no way dismissing the idea of Americans or Europeans coming to serve; it is always great to serve alongside brethren from different cultures. It is mutually beneficial, rewarding and brings credibility to the work, too.

In the last two decade of our involvement in church-planting, it has become evident that we need to also focus on structures or "church buildings." Yes, this is costly. Some will argue why such investment. Why invest in a building? Below are a few reasons from a "third world" and cultural perspective:

- ✓ Basic protection from the elements
- √ An "established" presence in the community
- √ A central sending-out point for evangelism
- ✓ Host community events
- √ Impacts ministry potential
- ✓ Enhanced witness to unbelievers
- ✓ Cultural relevance and credibility

A typical church building in the village will cost between \$15,000 and \$20,000. In the city it is much higher. Our focus in the coming years will be in assisting a number of BFL related church plants in having an "established" presence in their communities. Will you prayerfully consider being a part of this legacy?









# Leadership & Disipleship through Expository Teaching



he phenomenal growth of the church across Africa brings with it many challenges. One of these challenges is how to sustain the numerical growth while ensuring that the faith of Christians is firmly grounded in the revealed word of God – the Bible.

Any attempt to mobilize the Church in Africa for deserving projects such as evangelism, church-planting, community development, the struggle against HIV/AIDS etc., will in the long-term yield a poor harvest because of an untrained and a scripturally and theologically unsound workforce or disciples. BFL brings hundreds of pastors and church leaders together yearly. Many are keenly open to the spiritual renewal that the Lord of the Church brings to them when they gather across the impractical traditional barriers existing between them.

They need the refreshment that a change in the environment brings within their own national context. We are grateful for our ongoing partnership with Dr. Ken Mitchell and the people of Westside Chapel in Jacksonville, FL. Through this partnership, informal training is offered to hundreds of pastors across our region each year. You too can be a part of this by sponsoring training or helping in planting a sound biblical based church!

### Ways YOU can get Involved with BFL

PRAYER - Nothing of eternal significance happens apart from prayer. We want to continue to enlist you to pray for the ministries and various needs of BFL. Pray for us daily, weekly or as you are led by the Lord!

**BEULAHLAND FARMS** - We are looking for folks with farming or agricultural background who can volunteer with us for ten days, weeks or months at a time to help with our ministry base in Dimako. This is one of our self-sustaining projects that is aimed to serve as a ministry and service base while simultaneously creating needed employment and generating income for continuity.

WATER FOR LIFE PROJECT - About \$6,000 has come in towards the \$34,000 needed to buy a well rig equipment. This will be a HUGE blessing across a region where people are dying for lack of a clean and reliable source of water.

**CHURCH PLANTING** - We are in need of \$15,000 for a temporary building of a new church plant in Yaounde (Ekklesia). This church

was recently launched in Mendong and already has about 50 new converts from our door to door evangelism. They are being discipled and positioned for our official launch of the church in December with a weeklong evangelistic crusade in the community.

GIDEON 300 PARTNERS - Our work has mostly been supported by 30 friends and 8 churches that give to BFL monthly. We are still 50% below our monthly budget. We are trusting God for 300 "Gideons", those who will commit to giving \$25 or more monthly to cover the ongoing monthly operational cost of BFL.

CONTAINER SHIPPED - A 40 foot container was shipped in late August with a donated van from Believers Community Church of Batesville; tons of medical supplies from friends in Jacksonville, Batesville and Atlanta; two major pieces of equipment for Beulahland farms and a wide range of ministry supplies. We will need between \$10,000 and \$15,000 for duties as well as clearing related charges.
